

Vale Merryn Auldist Valley Potter Member By Claire Johnson

Merryn passed away unexpectedly in early February. Like so many, I was shocked and greatly saddened reading this news on a Facebook post but not in the least surprised by the multitude of people expressing how Merryn had helped them when they were in need. She was an exceptional person. A former nurse, she was known for her warmth, kindness and dedication, particularly in promoting inclusivity and supporting the community. Her most recent employment was with Caladenia Dementia Care and she was a proud foster carer of two young children and 'Aaji 'to her beloved grandson.



Much was made of her achievements at her memorial service and rightly so. It was however the creative side of Merryn that I knew best. We met when we were both students at Chisolm Tafe studying the diploma of arts (Ceramics) in the mid-90s. At the time she was making functional work and developing a rich black glaze breaking to electric blue. Like many students, upon graduating Merryn became a member of the Valley Potters and also served on the committee for several years. She joined Stonehouse in Warrandyte and held an exhibition of sculptural work that featured one of her great loves, wombats. I'm sure it was their dogged determination that she admired and which was also one her great strengths. She also volunteered her time helping Damian Thomas and Kevin Somerfield teaching pottery to students with acquired brain injuries at Potters Cottage.

As time passed her work in community services took her away from pottery and so she lent me her pottery equipment, helping me set up my teaching studio and supporting me immensely with her faith in my abilities. Over the years she managed to introduce a wide variety of arts to many of the people she worked with in the community. She, like most of us, understood how beneficial it can be. We shared advice on varying art projects, her helping me with grants applications and me firing work for her community art projects or sharing opinions on each other's latest creations through social media.

Most of all Merryn was always there for me with a cup of tea and a comforting smile, she would listen patiently and without judgment. I will miss her greatly as I'm sure will so so many others. She is survived by her only son Xan Auldist and grandson Tanvir.

Valley Potters Memorial Awards

New members to the Valley Potters may not know the history behind some of the awards that are given out at our annual exhibitions. Along with Functional, Sculptural and Thrown categories, there are also two memorial awards given in honour of pivotal Valley Potters members.

Ruth Petersen Award sponsored by Colin Petersen

Ruth was well known for her beautiful frog decorated pots, not just throughout the pottery world, but also by the public, many who were avid collectors of her work. She had been an active member of Valley Potters for many years and a former committee treasurer. Her illness did not stop her attending workshops or events, and she continued to pot as much as she could. A founding member of The Studio @ Flinders she was passionate in promoting all things ceramic as well as other mediums.

Ruth passed away in 2017 and many of us still miss her contribution to our group. It is a lovely gesture by Ruth's husband Colin to sponsor an annual award in Ruth's name.

Ruth Petersen, as an artist, was open to innovative ideas. She was prepared to challenge her skills and explore new ways of expressing her creative abilities to see where they would take her. This award is to be presented to an artist with a similar approach to their work.

Lisbeth Duncan Award (formerly Acquistion Award)

- · Criteria: Most outstanding work in exhibition. Not limited to form or function.
- · Consideration: Demonstrating skill and a clear direction. A fully resolved piece with a confident grasp of the medium.

Lisbeth Duncan was a student at Chisholm College in the 1990's and through her involvement with the college became an active member of the Valley Potters. Work commitments led to the Duncan's relocating to Germany, but Lisbeth continued to maintain her links with the Valley Potters whilst overseas. Upon her return, she renewed her contact with the college and returned to upgrade her qualifications. After serious complications with a shoulder operation Lisbeth was confined to a nursing home and no longer able to pursue her passion for potting. Peter, her husband kindly donated Lisbeth's equipment, tools, books and materials to the Valley Potters and Chisholm College. The proceeds of the sale of equipment and materials are used for a perpetual prize in Lisbeth's name in the Valley Potters annual exhibition. Sadly, in October 2009 Lisbeth passed away after a long period of incapacitation

This award befits Lisbeth's commitment to her craft, the college and the Valley Potters.

I attended Chisholm College with both these lovely ladies, brilliant potters and wonderful friends. It was as a privilege to be friends with both and a lovely way to remember each of them.

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


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
