## Moccha Diffusion

This unusual method of decoration creates beautiful Dendritic patterns that resemble trees and landscapes. It is best used over a white slip, using a common acid such as Apple Cider Vinegar. It is done over leather hard clay and can be left unglazed, though interiors would need to be glazed.

#### Moccha Method

First, dip, pour, or brush the leather-hard object with slip. While the surface is still wet, and before it has begun to lose its shine, the acid/colour mix is dripped or trailed into it. This is best done using a well-loaded brush held just touching the slip. If the viscosity of the slip and the acid/colour mix is right, the feathering pattern will take place naturally, as the acid eats a fern-like pathways through the slip, pulling the colorant with it.

The mixture used to form the patterns is called "mocha tea." It originally was made by boiling tobacco leaves to form a thick sludge that was then thinned with water to a working consistency and mixed with colour. Nicotine solutions are a form of mild acid, and any form of mild acid will work, such as citric acid, lemon juice, coffee, wine or vinegar, particularly natural apple-cider vinegar.

The mix is made as a solution of acid mixed with colorant.








## Need help with glaze chemistry?

Besides the myriad of glaze books on the market, here are a couple of online resources which you may find useful. They will help you to store and tweak your glaze recipes, research glaze materials and perhaps find new recipes.



Glazy.org is a free ceramics recipe library that allows anyone to add, browse, review and compare glaze & clay recipes. Glazy is an online glaze calculation software that promotes sharing recipes and test results so that potters can learn more about ceramic chemistry while verifying and improving results. Users post photos of their test tiles and recipes for others to try, or if you prefer, you can keep a private register of your own glazes.



Glazy.org offers multiple search criteria and all recipes are positioned on the Stull Chart as well as full chemical breakdown.



Digitalfire.com has been around since the 1980's. Tony Hanson shares his glaze knowledge, identifying and solving problems. There is an amazing reference library of articles that you can search - from the chemical breakdown of raw materials to why firing one cone lower may improve glaze results, to in-depth details about oxides.

Although there are tested recipes available on Digitalfire, it not really about trading recipes. Through the articles, they teach people to see glazes as oxide formulas. It is a fantastic resource library.

For those of you wanting to tweak glaze recipes, and use software to do so, they offer an online resource called <a href="https://insight-live.com">https://insight-live.com</a> (there is a fee for this service). Here you can create your own library of glaze recipes to research and alter.

A sample of the analysis provided from Insight-live.com.
You are able to adjust ingredients and determine the changes to the chemical analysis. [Note this can be done in Glazy too]

## Our visit with a legend

During a recent road trip to Adelaide we had the privilege of spending time with the most energetic potter you will ever meet. Neville Salha and his wife Lynn graciously welcomed us into their home(s) not once, but twice on our trip and I thought I would share it with you. Shira Ash (fellow VP member) and our husbands shared this amazing experience.

Neville is 68 years young, and is a legend in every sense of the word. He has had an amazing career in ceramics and is such a generous person with his time and energy. He studied at the South Australian School of Art in the 70's. He has taught at South Australian Uni and at the Victorian College of the Arts, and most recently spent the last 16 years in Beirut teaching at the American University of Beirut. He ran the Meat Market in North Melbourne at a time when arts flourished (according to him it was the best time of his life), and he ran the Jam Factory in SA for four years.

He and Lynn have a passion for restoration. About 40 years ago a friend suggested he buy a dilapidated old Church in Dutton SA. For those of you who may not know, Dutton is a small town in the Barossa. They have painstakingly restored the church into a wonderful home and added an amazing studio which he was very happy to show us. Neville is very proud of the fact that he did the restoration himself, laying all the stonework, raising the ceiling and installing cedar beams befitting a church, and creating a sunken conversation pit where the alter once stood. The main room is adorned with Neville's pieces many of which were black fired. Pieces of note were a very large urn built as a protest to war, covered in bandages, the Cocoon series, and the pots that commemorate life events, like the birth of his children.

Neville told us that 'making is like playing music, like finding your own notes on a guitar'. He wonderfully danced around the studio with energy and joy, bringing smiles to our faces.

He talked about the calligraphic mark making, which is typical of much of his work, that forms the language of his pots. The mark making is influenced by both Arabic and Japanese, he makes the marks with movement from right to left reflecting Arabic language. Although they may look like lettering, the marks are not actually letters or words but a beautiful sense of them.


Neville spoke a lot about teaching. Not only does he love teaching, but he values learning from his students. He shared with us a fun story about when he first started teaching in Beirut he introduced himself whilst standing on his head, and challenged his students to do the same - all to break down barriers!

Neville's wife Lynn is a high school art teacher. Her corner of the studio building is filled with an amazing collection of vintage children's books and beautiful antique furniture including printer's shelves carefully transported to Dutton.

Lynn proudly showed us the wagga she has been working on in memory of her mother. Born out of necessity, the wagga is a particular kind of utilitarian quilt made in Australia. Traditionally consisting of multiple layers of jute (burlap) bags sewn together, they may also include calico sacks, recycled clothes, fabric scraps and old blankets. She has one that her mother made from family momentos including her father's old jumpers lovingly restored by Lynn.

Now Lynn is making a wagga to honour her mother.

Neville took us down to 'the cellar' - or at least that's what I call it, where he proudly houses a collection of his own work and pieces he has been acquired from other potters.





Lynn and Neville spend their lives between Dutton and Adelaide, where they are restoring the Q Theatre in Hastings street - another old church. They live upstairs, and are creating an amazing performance / entertainment / gallery space downstairs. Helping Neville fulfil his dream of making it a place where people can experience ceramics and food and music, creating a collaborative venue bringing food, art and music together. I can imagine Neville making pots and dancing whilst sharing the stage with musicians and other artists.

It's hard to capture what an impact meeting Neville and Lynn has had - their warmth and generosity abound. It was 2 days I will never forget.

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
