



VALLEY POTTERS WORKSHOP My Play with 'MAGIC DUST' for the recent Pit Firing by Sharon Twining

I came across this enlightening article while preparing for the pit firing. It was from "Pottery Making Illustrated" Nov/Dec 2016. The article is titled 'Pit Firing -Colour Palette' by Eduardo Lazo. It is well worth a look.

This article has the recipe for 'Magic Dust'. It suggests a mixture of one third copper carbonate to two thirds salt. Two cups of this can be sprinkled liberally on the combustibles in the pit with care taken not to get it directly on the ware. However, it can also be made into a solution with the addition of a very small amount of cobalt carbonate, that can be either sprayed or brushed onto ware before being bisqued. It can also be applied to the inside walls of a saggar.

I made up a mixture consisting of 20gms salt, 10 gms copper carbonate and 1.5 gms cobalt carbonate into 250 mls of water. (NB. My ratio calculations are most likely inaccurate as maths was never my strong point.) With this mixture I proceeded to spray one of my pots, and I brushed some onto the inside of another pot. These were bisqued and the results looked quite promising. I didn't photograph these pots before going into the pit but the results were very interesting; Strong blues and the mixture stuck very well.

The results after the pit firing were a little mixed. The spray marks very evident and were quite black with tiny flashes of red in some spots. The brushed areas that were inside one pot were also very black. I also brushed some of the 'magic dust' solution onto some parts of the pots but as far as I could tell it didn't result in any noticeable marks on the surface.

Overall, I was quite pleased with the results from this pit firing. Another article I found informative was from The Journal of Australian Ceramics Volume 56 No 2, July 2017.

It was a great day and I would like to thank Danielle's family for providing the venue for this experience.

MEMBER EXPERIENCE

Cameron Williams -Throw Bigger!

I was fortunate to attend a two-day workshop hosted by Soul Clay Studio, and led by Cameron Williams. The Studio was in the beautiful coastal town of Gerringong, which is a picturesque place and so inspiring after a long drive through and over the mountains. Cameron is renowned for throwing massive pots and pieces for large hotels and commercial premises.





He began by demonstrating how he goes about centring 5 – 10 kilos of clay on very large bats. He was very clear on how to hold the fingers and palm of your hand in order to get the maximum lift. He encouraged us to use the flat palm of our left hand, pinch with your right hand as you pull up...and do this on the left side of your wheel! Then revert back to the right hand side and continue throwing in the usual way. Compress the rim after every lift...he uses the web between his fingers to compress. His way of working was considered and efficient, taking his time at each part of the construction, without labouring or wearing the clay out. He gave us all a handout that was beautifully drawn, a talented artist and potter.

After a morning of watching and note taking, we were able to have a go ourselves! Our first task was to throw a large cylinder, with as much clay as you felt comfortable with. I began with 4 kilos and surprised myself at how easily the clay moved up using his techniques. Everyone there was excited and able to create tall, wonderful cylinders. We shared a lunch, talking about all we had learned, where we came from and what our specialties were.

Lunch done and everyone was very keen to watch him demonstrate throwing large bowls. A slightly different way to pull up and out this time, and using a sponge to disperse the pressure. I spent my time throwing bowls, getting bigger and bigger each time, and cutting them in half to check the thickness.

Weary and muddy it was time to go home to the Carayan Park, stroll on the

Weary and muddy it was time to go home to the Caravan Park, stroll on the beach and have a lovely meal. Bright and early I set off for a day of throwing two piece pots, and stretching my centring skills. I took a couple of blocks of my own clay that was a bit groggier than the clay supplied. I felt it had more "tooth" and held up better to get a taller piece. I was pretty happy with the four pots I decided to keep- and had to pack them especially well, in order to get them home on the long drive back to Menzies Creek.








I was fairly wrapped up in my own attempts but eventually took the time to wander around and watch other people achieve amazing pots. There was an awful lot of recycling of clay, trying to throw bigger, thinner, taller, wider, better. The enthusiasm and excitement was contagious and the smiles on everyone's faces said it all.

I have been making pots for many years and am fairly confident on the wheel, but there is always an opportunity to learn something new and share skills. As there are very few TAFE or Ceramic courses, it is imperative that we share all the knowledge that we can, help each other and be encouraging for the younger potters coming up. As creative people we learn through trial and error and asking questions...let's keep asking!

I am fortunate to live in the beautiful, tree studded village of Emerald on the boundary of Emerald Lake Park. This year we purchased a purpose-built studio from Stilla and have erected this so that I can focus on my journey in ceramics and also have the ability to run small classes. My pottery studio, recently completed, marks an important step in the evolution of my ceramic practice. It has been a game changer having a dedicated space, out of the house, away from the interruptions and surrounded by forest, accompanied by the distant call of Puffing Billy's steam engine and it provides both the solitude and focus needed to expand my creative language. I have enough room for my slab roller that my husband built and I also have a small, separate kitchenette for tea and coffee. As I make most of my own glazes, it has plenty of shelf space purchased from Ikea.

I also have a single phase, front-loading electric kiln; the decision of where to place it took a while. It is actually located up at my house in the carport. As we are on an acre, I decided I needed the kiln near me so I can check it when it is running overnight. I am also excited to say that I have registered to open the studio this year for the Australian Ceramics Open Studio 2025, just to be able to share my space and to meet fellow potters. I would love it if you came to visit.


